

## Pirate Glossary

Word/Phrase	English Translation
<b>Ahoy!</b>	Hello!
<b>Avast ye</b>	Stop and check this out, pay attention, or whoa!
<b>Aye/Arrgh/Yarr</b>	Yes indeed! Argh can also be an exhortation of discontent or disgust
<b>Give me leave to say</b>	Let me say
<b>Handsomely/Smartly</b>	Quickly or carefully; in a shipshape style
<b>Hang the Jib</b>	To pout or frown
<b>I'll not omit to tell you</b>	I will tell you something important
<b>Lad/Lass</b>	Younger male/female
<b>Lookout</b>	A person posted to keep watch on the horizon for other ships or signs of land
<b>Lubber</b>	Land lover, or poor seamen
<b>Mark me</b>	Listen to me
<b>Me Hearties</b>	My friends (a great way to end a sentence)
<b>Savvy?</b>	Do you understand and do you agree?
<b>Sea Dog</b>	An experienced seaman
<b>Show a Leg!</b>	Wake up!; used to wake a sleeping pirate
<b>Thar</b>	There (the opposite of "here")
<b>Belay</b>	Stop (Belay that landlubber talk!)
<b>Shiver me Timbers</b>	Well I'll be! (an exclamation stemming from when a cannon ball hits a ship and the planking shatters into splinters)
